I. Summary

Department of Psychology, 2004-05

Faculty: 20 T/TT, 2 Non-TT

Undergraduate Education

- Psychology added a substantial number of undergraduate first and second majors this year. We continued to offer a range of courses to serve our majors, along with seven Area 3 core courses.
- More than 125 undergraduates were enrolled in field study and undergraduate research credits and participated in community and research opportunities.
- Ezra Wegbreit, a graduating senior, was named the 2005 Outstanding Psychology Senior.
- Five psychology majors received 2005 Research Awards: Rachael Budowle, Matthew Cox, Leah Lozier, Karla Maslow, and Ezra Wegbreit.
- Sarah Koss, a triple major in Studio Art/Biology/Psychology, received a Goldwater Scholarship.
- The department sponsored two Minority Academic Opportunities Program (MAOP) Summer Research Interns during summer 2004; we have two interns selected for 2005.
- Roseanne Foti received an Alumni Teaching Award and was inducted in the Academy of Teaching Excellence.
- Robin Panneton received a College of Science Certificate of Teaching Excellence.
- E. Scott Geller was named a 2005 Virginia Outstanding Faculty Member and an Alumni Distinguished Professor of Psychology for his outstanding contributions to Virginia Tech.

Graduate Education

- The Clinical, Industrial/Organizational, and Psychological Sciences programs had 72 graduate students.
- Seventeen new graduate students accepted admission offers for August 2005. They had impressive qualifications (Median GPA=3.7, GRE-V=545, GRE-Q=630).
- Seven students received the M.S. and nine students received the Ph.D during 2004-05.
- Two students received clinical internships at highly selective research institutions.
- Eight graduate students received GRDP Research Awards, ranging from \$150–\$375.
- Sara Haden was named the College of Science Outstanding Graduate Student for 2004-05.
- Christy Wolfe received the Graduate Teaching Assistant Excellence Award for 2004-05.

Research and Scholarship

- Faculty members and graduate students were productive scholars: 36 published and 47 in-press peer-reviewed journal articles, 38 published or in-press books/book chapters, and more than 190 scientific presentations and workshops.
- During 2004-05, 12 faculty members had active grants or contracts from various funding agencies (NIH, FEMA, Commonwealth of Virginia, private corporations). Research awards exceeded \$2.0 M for FY2004.
- Six research faculty members were supported on external grant funding.
- Psychology faculty members were Editors or Associate Editors of six peer-reviewed journals and Editorial Board Members of 40 journals.

Outreach/Service

- The Psychological Services Center and the Child Study Center, the clinical graduate training clinics, provided clinical services to more than 125 community residents.
- Russell Jones received the 2004 College of Science Outreach Award.
- Tom Ollendick served as Past-President of Division 53: Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology of the American Psychological Association.
- Jack Finney was elected Fellow of the Society of Clinical Psychology, Division 12 of the American Psychological Association.

New Faculty Members Recruited:

- Kirby Deater-Deckard, University of Oregon, and Jungmeen Kim, University of Rochester, will join the faculty in August 2005; they were recruited as part of the Developmental Science Cluster Hire.

II. Academic Accomplishments

Research and Scholarship

- Psychology faculty members were authors/co-authors on 42 published and 40 in-press peer-reviewed journal articles and 47 published and in-press books/book chapters. They made more than 185 professional presentations and workshops.
- Twelve faculty members were involved with grants from the National Institutes of Health, Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Commonwealth of Virginia, and private corporations. The total annual grant awards exceeded \$2.0 million.
- E. Scott Geller was named a 2005 Virginia Outstanding Faculty Member by SCHEV.
- E. Scott Geller was named an Alumni Distinguished Professor of Psychology.
- Julie Dunsmore continued her research funded by an ASPIRES grants, with cost-sharing provided by the College of Science and the Department of Psychology.
- Six research faculty members were supported on external grant funding.
- Faculty members in psychology have ongoing research collaborations with faculty members in other departments, universities, and organizations: Human Nutrition, Foods, and Exercise; Human Development; Chemistry; Laboratory for the Study of Human Thought and Action; Statistics; College of Veterinary Medicine; Virginia Commonwealth University; Medical University of South Carolina; Medical College of Virginia; Stockholm University; Salem Veterans Affairs Medical Center; and the Child Health Investment Partnership of Roanoke Valley.
- Psychology faculty members were Editors or Associate Editors of six peer-reviewed journals and Editorial Board Members of 40 journals.
- The Departments of Psychology and Human Development received funding during 2004-05 for three graduate research assistantships in support of the development of the Program for Developmental Science Across the Lifespan, a collaborative research and graduate training initiative.
- Two new faculty members were recruited for August 2005 as part of the Developmental Science Cluster Hire. Kirby Deater-Deckard, University of Oregon, will join the department as a Professor. Jungmeen Kim, University of Rochester, will join the department as an Assistant Professor.

Graduate Education

- Seven psychology graduate students received the M.S. and nine psychology students received the Ph.D. in 2004-05.
- The Department of Psychology will admit 17 new graduate students for fall 2005. The incoming students have impressive credentials (Median GPA=3.7, GREV=545, GREQ=630, GRE-V+Q=1185). See the table below for area information.

- Graduate students' research and professional development were supported by awards established by donors to the department: The Galper Fund awarded \$2,000 for graduate students' professional development activities and the Clinical Child Research Fund awarded \$1,500 for graduate student research. Eight students also received research funding from the GSA's GRDP.
- Sara Chiara Haden received several awards during the past year, including an AdvanceVT Fellowship for 2005-06; the 2005 Student Research Award from the American Psychological Association, Division 53; and the Outstanding Graduate Student, College of Science, Virginia Tech (2005)
- Matthew Jarrett was selected to receive a Cunningham Doctoral Fellowship for his graduate study at Virginia Tech.
- Yvette Quintela was selected as one of the founding chapter members and President of the Graduate and Professional School Student Honor Society at Virginia Tech (Alpha Epsilon Lambda)
- Li Wan was selected to receive a Travel Award to attend the joint meeting of The EEG & Clinical Neuroscience Society and The International Society for NeuroImaging in Psychiatry
- Christy Wolfe received several honors, including the 2004-05 Graduate Teaching Assistant Excellence Award, an American Psychological Association Dissertation Award, and was invited to serve as a commencement speaker at the 2005 Graduate School Commencement Ceremony.

Undergraduate Education

- During 2004-05, more than 125 undergraduates were involved in research experiences with psychology faculty members and graduate students.
- Roseanne Foti received an Alumni Teaching Excellence Award and was inducted into the Academy of Teaching Excellence.
- Robin Panneton received a College of Science Certificate of Teaching Excellence.
- Sarah Koss, a triple major in Studio Art/Biology/Psychology, received a Goldwater Scholarship.
- Ezra Wegbreit was selected as the 2005 Outstanding Psychology Senior and received the award at the Department of Psychology's Commencement ceremony.
- Five graduating psychology seniors received Undergraduate Research Awards at the May 2005 Department of Psychology Commencement Ceremony: They were:
 - Rachael Budowle, who completed an honors thesis with Dr. Scott Geller on the impact of human-animal interaction in a residential substance abuse clinic for adolescents;
 - Matthew Cox, who was Involved with Dr. Scott Geller and Dr. Kent Glindemann in several studies of controlling alcohol use in college students;
 - Leah Lozier, who completed an honors thesis with Dr. Bruce Friedman on autonomic control of cardiovascular activity and the cold pressor task;
 - Karla Maslow, who completed an honors thesis with Dr. Robin Panneton on infants' preferences for native and foreign speech; and
 - Ezra Wegbreit, who completed an honors thesis with Dr. Helen Crawford on caffeine and selective attention.

- Faculty members served as mentors for Minority Academic Opportunities Program Summer Research Interns; two students interned in psychology in 2004 and two are involved during summer 2005.

Outreach/Service

- The Psychological Services Center & Child Study Center, the clinical graduate training clinics, provided clinical services to more than 125 community residents.
- Russell Jones received the 2004 College of Science Outreach Award.
- Tom Ollendick served as Past-President of Division 53: Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology of the American Psychological Association.
- Jack Finney was elected Fellow in the Society of Clinical Psychology, Division 12 of the American Psychological Association.
- Faculty members in psychology provide outreach and service to Montgomery County Public Schools and the Department of Social Services
- Scott Geller, an internationally renowned industrial safety speaker and consultant, gave dozens of workshops and keynote addresses at corporate and professional meetings.

Alumni/Development

- The Department of Psychology held its first Graduate Alumni Weekend, in conjunction with the dedication of newly renovated Williams Hall. More than 45 graduate alumni attended the weekend events.
- The department has begun the process of identifying and inviting undergraduate and graduate alumni and friends of the department to serve on the department's Advisory Board.

The 2005-06 Departmental Personnel Committee conducts the departmental review for promotion and tenure in accordance with the procedures described in the Faculty Handbook, which indicates that the departmental committee shall consist of the Department Chair and an appropriate faculty representation. For purposes of tenure recommendations, the Personnel Committee in the Department of Psychology shall consist of the Department Chair plus six other tenured faculty members; three elected by the full-time faculty and three appointed by the Department Chair after the election. Additional members may be appointed by the Department Chair to represent specialty areas for any year in which promotion or tenure is being considered. The committee composition will be announced in a manner which disregards the elected or appointed status of its membership. Based on faculty discussion and vote, and, consistent with the College of Sciences' Promotion and Tenure Committee, the "peel-off-by-rank" system will no longer be used for promotion to Professor. The Department Chair and the Personnel Committee may choose to

meet with Professors to discuss promotion considerations for candidates being considered for promotion to Professor.

The Departmental Personnel Committee shall be responsible for making recommendations for any new faculty appointments that will involve an entering tenure appointment and/or rank above assistant professor. The Departmental Personnel Committee will also be responsible for providing the Department Chair with an assessment of the degree to which the committee feels that each faculty member (below the rank of Professor) is progressing satisfactorily within rank. This is not to be confused with the assessment that the Annual Review Committee makes of the annual Faculty Activities Reports by the faculty. The former involves a review of the entire career of a faculty member, while the latter is an assessment of the productivity for one year. Both assessments will be shared with the faculty member at the time that the Department Chair provides the annual performance evaluation. The PROMOTE process was implemented by the Personnel Committee during 1998-99, and will be continued during the current academic year. The PROMOTE process is available in a separate document. The Personnel Committee also serves as the department's Post-tenure Review Committee, should a post-tenure review be required consistent with department and university policy.
